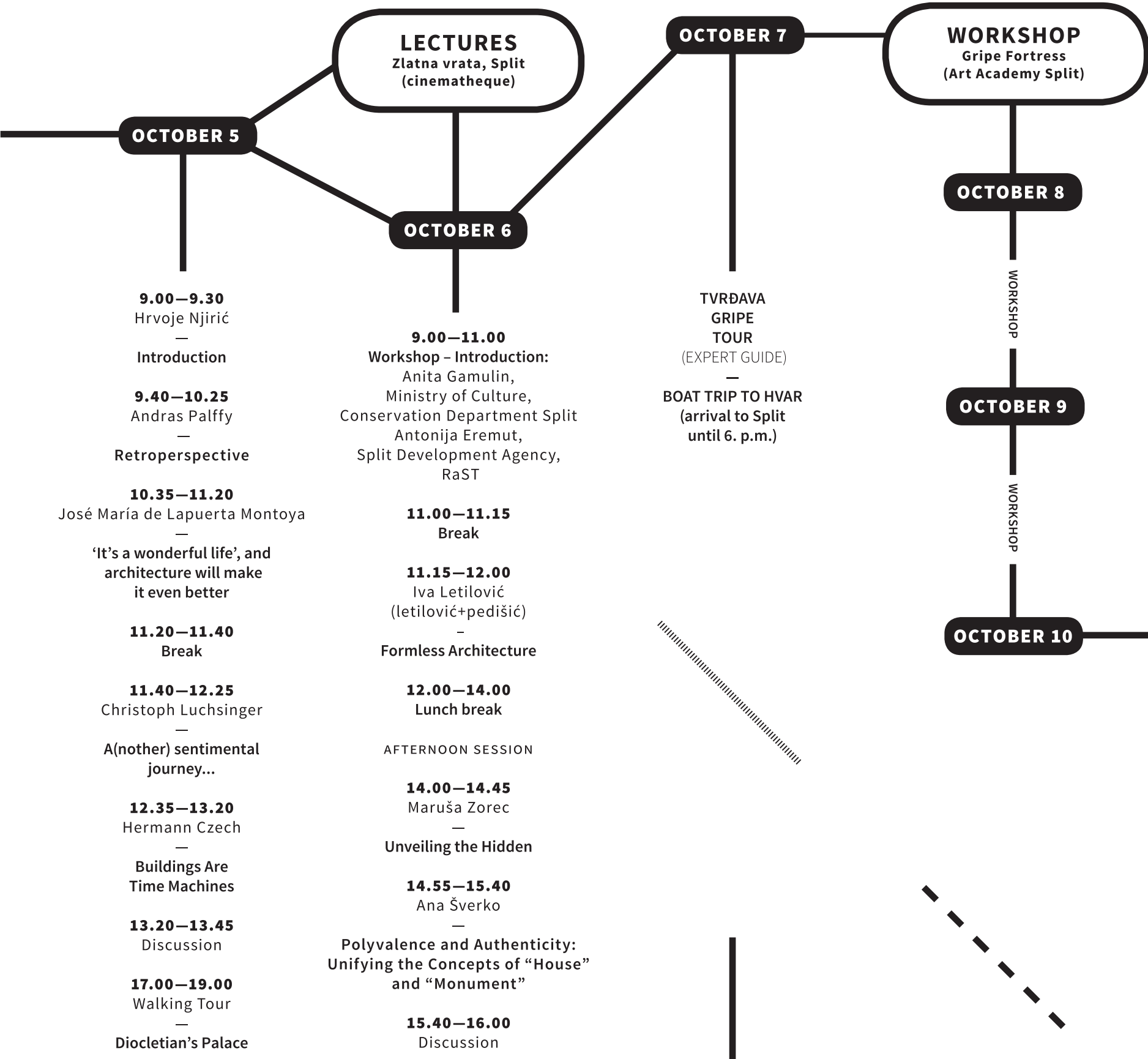

Founder and co-director of the Master in Collective Housing. Chair professor of Architectural Design of the School of Architecture of Madrid, ETSAM, UPM. Honorary professor of the University of Montevideo. Director of the Master in City Sciences (MCS), ETSAM, UPM.

In the academic field, Chema has a recognized career. In addition to his position as Chair professor at the ETSAM and Director of the Master in Collective Housing, he is director and coordinator of the PhD courses of the doctoral program agreement between the Universidad de la Republica de Uruguay and Universidad Politecnica de Madrid. He has also been director of the Summer School of the UPM, coordinator of the Master in Interior Design of the ETSAM and coordinator of the Socrates-Erasmus agreement with the Slovak University of Technology. He has been PhD director of several thesis and final thesis tutor at the ETSAM, UPM.

He has been member of the Cultural Council of Madrid, Member of the COAM Governing Board and representative of the High Council of Architects. He has also participated as jury of several architecture awards and competitions and has been lecturer in conferences all around the world.

He is a member of the Research Group on Collective Housing of the ETSAM, UPM and has participated in different research projects. His writings have been published in books and magazines such as *Arquitectura Viva*, *Habitação e Cidade* or *Ciudad y Territorio*, among others. He is the author of the books *Collective housing: a manual* and *Housing, envelope, frame*.

In the professional field, he is founder and CEO of DL+A architects, a studio that has been running for more than 25 years. The work of the studio has been published and awarded in national and international contests and they have opened a new headquarters in Brazil for the development of the first prize the won in a competition for the CDHU of Brazil.



Iva Letilović

Graduated in 1997 from the Faculty of Architecture, University of Zagreb. In 2003 she founded an architecture office together with Morana Vlahović, where she worked until 2007. She has since been working with the architect Igor Pedišić. From 2007 she worked as a lecturer and then as an assistant professor the Faculty of Architecture, Civil Engineering and Geodesy in Split. She has been actively engaged with architecture since 2000 and has participated in numerous tenders, exhibitions and projects realized in architecture and public space.

She received professional awards in Croatia and abroad. Notable awards: Piranesi award at the Piran Days of Architecture 2003 in Piran, the Vladimir Nazor annual award in 2003, Drago Galic Award for the best achievement in the field of residential architecture in 2003, special Piranesi Special Award at the Piran Days of Architecture 2004 in Piran, recognition at the international competition "Das Erste Haus" organized by *Bauwelt* magazine 2004, Silver Plate for best achievements of young European architects at the European Architecture Award Luigi Cosenza in 2004, and the third prize at the 41st Zagreb Salon of architecture. Along with the recent nominations for the Bernardo Bernardi, Drago Galic, and Viktor Kovacic awards, she is a laureate of the Bernardo Bernardi award for 2011, the international award at the 2016 East Centric Architecture Triennale. and the Bernardo Bernardi award for 2018.

Hrvoje Njirić

An architect and founder of njiric+ arhitekti, who lives and works in Zagreb (Croatia). His projects are representative examples of residential buildings and contemporary forms of housing. In addition to his extraordinary architectural production, Njirić is also active as a lecturer and critic. He has lectured at the HAB Weimar, ETSAB Barcelona, TU Wien, AA School of Architecture London, ETH Zuerich, Strathclyde University of Glasgow, Politecnico di Milano, Southeast University of Nanjing, ETSAM Madrid, William Lyon Somerville and he has been a visiting professor at the University of Calgary. Njirić has coordinated international workshops in Zagreb, Merano, Maribor, Gorizia, Barcelona, Brescia, Santiago-in La Corunja, Aarhus, Trieste, Kriva, Hasselt, Rijeka and Calgary. Hrvoje Njirić has been a jury member for the competitions in Croatia, Austria, Spain, Slovenia, Germany, Romania, Italy and the Czech Republic.

His work has been exhibited in group exhibitions around the world. Independent presentations includes, "colors" (AA - London, University of Strathclyde - Glasgow, "manifesto" - Edinburgh, University of Newcastle - Newcastle), "kalvarienquertel" (Desing Kunstcentrum - Antwerp) and "I can do what I want" - urban diptych (Tic-Roban Gallery - Zagreb). He has received numerous awards while his practice has been extensively published in national and international press.

Hermann Czech

Born in Vienna, studied with Konrad Wachsmann at the Summer Academy Salzburg and with Ernst A. Plishke at the Academy of Fine Arts in Vienna. His heterogeneous work includes planning, housing, school and hotel buildings as well as interventions of small scale and exhibition design.

His numerous critical and theoretical publications on architecture include research and editions on Otto Wagner, Adolf Loos, Josef Frank, Christopher Alexander. In his theory ("architecture is background") the notions of conversion and mannerism play a significant role.



András Pálffy

Univ. Prof. Arch. DI, born in Budapest 1954, studied architecture at the University of Technology (TU) Vienna. After a visiting professorship at the University for Art and Industrial Design, Linz (2001-2002), András Pálffy was appointed full professor at the Department of Design and Theory of Design, TU, Vienna, in 2003. He was president of the Secession, Association of Visual Artists Vienna Secession, from 2007 to 2013 and has been head of the Institute of Architecture and Design at TU, Vienna, since 2012. Jabornegg & Pálffy was established in 1988. The focus of the office Jabornegg & Pálffy is based to a notable part on works concerning an urban historical context, historical monuments and exhibition spaces.



Ana Šverko

Graduated in architecture from the Faculty of Architecture, University of Zagreb in 1998; she received her MUD from UC Berkeley, College of Environmental Design in 2002, and her PhD from the University of Zagreb in 2011. She participated in a post-doctoral Harvard University research seminar organized as part of the Getty Foundation's Connecting Art Histories initiative (2014—2015).

Her background is in Architecture, Urban Design, Heritage Conservation and Architectural History. From 1998 to 2012 she was an employee of the Conservation Department of the Ministry of Culture of Republic of Croatia, from 2009 as senior adviser. Since 2012, she has been employed at the Institute of Art History, Cvito Fisković Centre in Split. Additionally she works part-time at the Department of Urban Planning of the Faculty of Civil Engineering, Architecture and Geodesy in Split.

She has worked on a variety of historic buildings conservation projects (over 20 projects), mainly as a project manager, and in the development of architectural projects, conservation studies and architectural heritage measurement.

Her field of research includes architecture and landscape in cultural-social context, regeneration of historic urban environment, and its relationship with digital humanities. She takes part in the organisation of student workshops, specialised and scholarly public lectures, seminars and conferences aimed at the popularisation of science. She has published on topics across Early Modern and Modern Architecture, Heritage Conservation and Urban Design.
